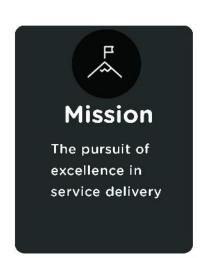

## GENDER DIVERSITY SURVEY - INTRODUCTION

- Many countries continue to take deliberate steps (including setting quotas and requiring public disclosure) to address the underrepresentation of women on corporate boards. The Nigerian Code of Corporate Governance mandates the Board of Directors to approve a policy that promotes diversity in its membership and establish measurable objectives for achieving diversity in gender and other areas.
- The survey undertaken by DCSL in 2016 covered a three-year period (2013-2015) to track the level and growth of female representation on the Boards of companies quoted on the Nigerian Stock Exchange, indicated that female representation on Boards of companies in the Manufacturing Sector increased from 8% in 2013 to 12% in 2014 and remained at 12% in 2015. In the Conglomerates, from a nil position in 2013, 1 female Director was appointed in 2014 with no change in 2015. In the Oil & Gas Sector, female representation was at 15% in 2013 and declined to 10% in 2014 but increased to 14% in 2015
- There was an increase in female representation on Boards of companies in the Publishing Sector from 19% in 2013 and 2014 to 22% in 2015. In the General Services Sector, female representation rose from a nil position in 2013 to 12% in 2014 and remained at this level in 2015.
- In the Banking Sector, female representation on boards rose from 19% in 2013 to 21% in 2014 and 25% in 2015. This is below the 30% that the Banks have committed to under the Sustainable Banking Principles. Female representation on boards of non-bank financial services companies rose from 14% in 2013 to 15% in 2014 and 17% in 2015. Female representation on boards of companies in the Insurance Sector remained at 15% in 2013 and 2014 and slightly increased to 16% in 2015. Total number of female Directors on boards of companies in the Information Technology Sector rose from 6% in 2013 to 7% in 2014 and 10% in 2015
- This Survey was undertaken to ascertain the level and growth of female representation on the Boards of companies quoted on the Nigerian Exchange Limited over a five-year period - 2016
   -2020 in the major sectors of the Nigerian economy- viz:
- Manufacturing
- Conglomerates
- ·Oil & Gas
- •General Services
- Banking
- Insurance
- Financial Services
- ·Publishing; and
- Information technology

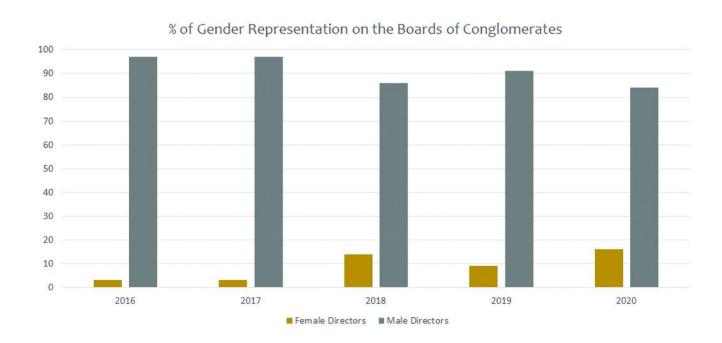

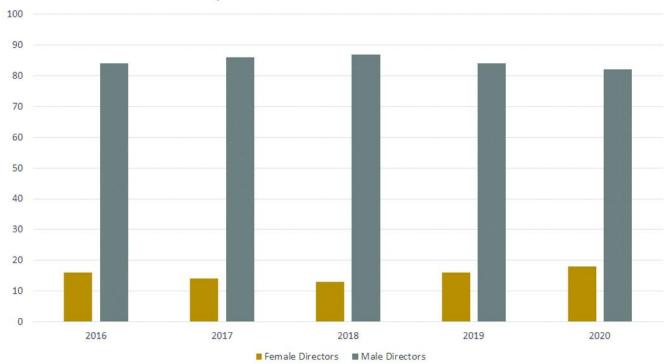
Female representation on Boards of companies in the Conglomerates Sector increased from 3% in 2016 to 16% in 2020.

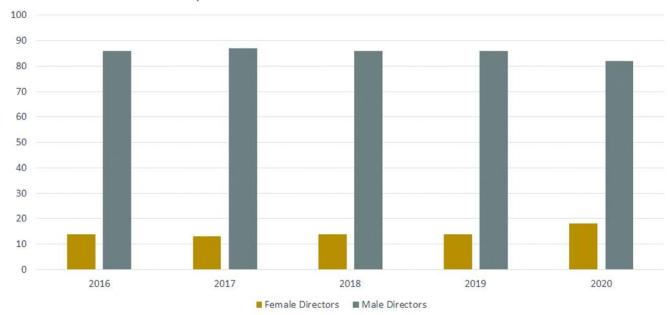
Female representation in this sector experienced a decline from 16% in 2016 to 13% in 2018 before increasing to 16% and 18% respectively in 2019 and 2020.

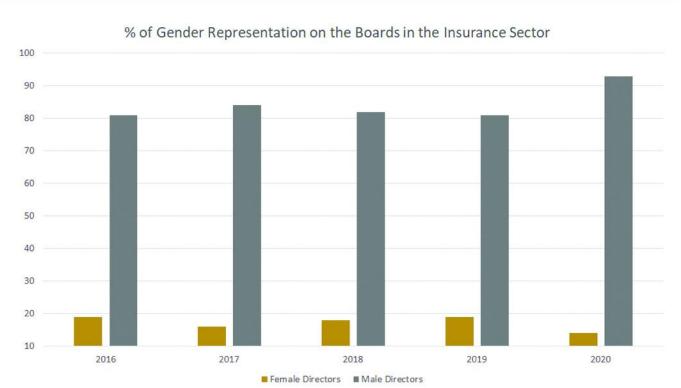


Female representation in this sector remained relatively stable at 14% between 2016 to 2019 but increased to 18% in 2020.

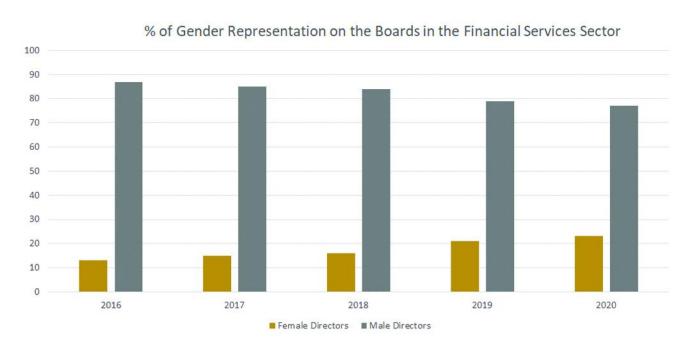


Female representation in this sector declined from 19% in 2016 to 14% in 2020.

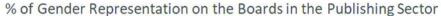


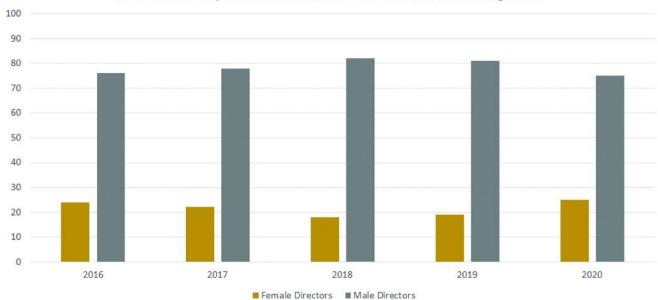
Female representation in this sector increased from 13% in 2016 to 23% in 2020

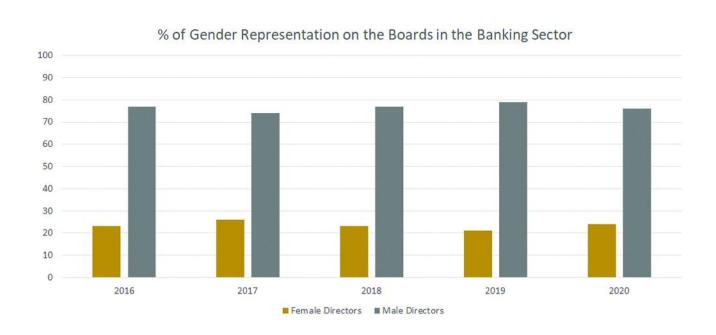


Female representation on Boards of companies in the publishing sector declined from 24% in 2016 to 18% in 2018 but increased from 19% in 2019 to 25% in 2020.

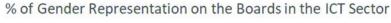


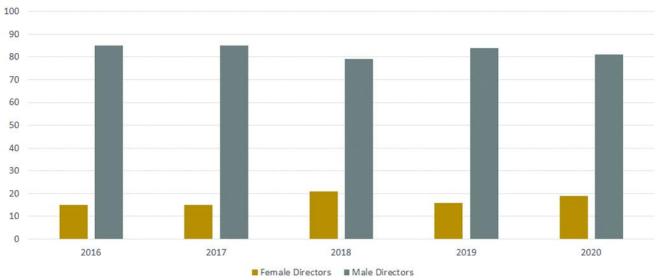
The percentage of female representation remained relatively stable between 2016 (23%) and 2020 (24%), with slight fluctuations recorded during the period

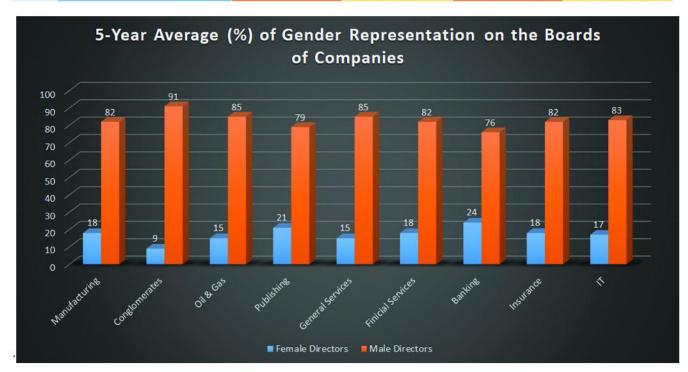


Female representation on Boards of companies in the ICT sector rose from 15% in 2016 to 19% in 2020.

## GENDER DIVERSITY ON BOARDS - SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

- We collated data from 101 of the companies listed on the Nigerian Exchange Limited between 2016 and 2020. The analysis shows that of the 2242 Directors on the Boards of the 101 companies surveyed over a 5-year period, female directors comprise only 17%.
- It is quite disconcerting that female representation on Boards in Nigeria remain far below the 30% goal set by the World Economic Forum as a foundation to more gender equal boards.
- The Banking sector is yet to meet the 30% target set by the Central Bank of Nigeria's Sustainable Banking Principles that Nigeria Banks committed to, with average female representation at 24% over the 5-year period.

### CONCLUSION

- According to "Diligent Insights" there are any number of reasons private and public organizations should seek greater gender diversity in the boardroom, including women's abilities and backgrounds, pressure from investors and regulations
- Goldman Sachs' CEO David Solomon announced in January 2020, "Starting on July 1st, in the US and Europe, we're not going to take any company public unless there's at least one diverse board candidate, with a focus on women," adding "... the performance of IPOs where there's been a woman on the board in the US is significantly better than the performance of IPOs where there hasn't been a woman on the board in the long run, this I think is the best advice for companies that want to drive premium returns for their shareholders over time."
- A study recently published in the Harvard Business Review reinforces Solomon's views. The study's authors found that female board members helped balance the overconfidence of male CEOs, and the result was improved decision-making for the business. The report correlated CEOs' overconfidence to overestimation of returns and underestimation of risk, both of which can diminish shareholder value. Inclusion of women, they found, improved the quality of board deliberations, and different perspectives increased the information available for exploring and resolving complex issues. They also observed that female directors are more independent in their views since their backgrounds are devoid of "old boy network" connections
